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All History is Local: Wilton, 1066 and the VCH Past, Present and Future

Another of our very successful online talks, hosted by the Wiltshire Museum, was given to around 50 people on the 13th October by Professor Catherine Clarke.

Catherine is the Director of the Centre for the History of People, Place and Community at the Institute of Historical Research and as such is also the Director of the VCH. She is a cultural historian specialising in the Middle Ages, but she also works across a wide range of periods on questions of place, identity, heritage and uses of the past.

Starting with the Battle of Hastings in 1066, on the face of it having no obvious links with Wilton, which settlement was already a Royal seat, location of a mint, on a convergence of routes and a market centre (VCH, Vol 6, 1962).

Edward the Confessor, whose death in 1066 caused a power struggle leading eventually to the Battle of Hastings, was married to Edith, daughter of Godwin of Essex, who was educated at the Benedictine nunnery at Wilton. Her namesake, Saint Edith who had been abbess at the nunnery, was revered at Wilton.

The 1066 Norman Conquest had repercussions in Wilton as it caused the collapse of the English elite: Wessex men had marched to Hastings; Wilton homes were wrecked.

This is where the VCH takes up the story: it fills in the gaps and silences in our understanding of the past. Parish by parish, from earliest documents to the present day, it describes our social, economic and religious history: a diverse community of historians, managed from London, but powered locally.

After outlining this link between national and local history, Catherine enthusiastically described how the VCH is moving with the times to keep people engaged.

The recent Red Box Project was a great success and the artefacts sent in by each county are now part of a permanent online exhibition. Research for the volumes is put onto the website as it becomes available, as are talks and seminars held at the Institute of Historical Research. This online content is read and valued all over the world.

On a more local level, the new Smartphone app and walks available on the website give people maps and information about places of interest near them.

Post Covid the national focus is on 'Levelling Up' and the IHR has taken this on board: focusing on the past, but as a resource for thinking about the future, informing their policy making and retaining a local sense of place.

The Effects of the Coronavirus
