# **Anatomy of Collecting**

The fundraising talk, in Bradford-on-Avon on the 18th March, by Wiltshire based antiques expert and tv presenter Marc Allum was an unqualified success, despite the best efforts of the snowy weather to prevent the event.

Marc, who lives in Chippenham in a house he believes to be on the site of King Alfred's encampment, started his talk by explaining collecting and how he came to be interested in antiques. He described collecting as 'historically inherent' in all of us. As a child he started out collecting free things, such as, sea shells and stones with holes in them: items don't need to have value to be of interest.

When he later worked in an auction house, he never wanted to specialise and his collecting, likewise, is very eclectic. So when he joined Antiques Roadshow he still didn't become a specialist and is just as likely to be asked to talk about a 1960's jacket or a collection of bottles.

As he spoke, Marc talked about items brought along by the audience, again an eclectic mix; a bone dagger from Papua New Guinea; a 500 year old Egyptian kohl pallet; a bosun's whistle that had been a christening present in India in 1818; a Nepalese thunderbolt; and a mid 20th century jam jar opener.

Marc drew the proceedings to a close with an amusing anecdote about a violin, which had survived the Titanic sinking, proving that ordinary objects can be made interesting and valuable by extraordinary situations.
